

# HORTICULTURE & FLORICULTURE FLOWER SHOW

NOTICE: Entries will be accepted on Tuesday from noon to 8:00 p.m. Only Section I (arrangements and certain flowers that have been noted\*) will be accepted on Wednesday from 9:00 to 9:30 a.m. NO ENTRIES MAY BE REMOVED UNTIL Sunday from 12:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.

NOTE: Exhibitors should come prepared with all information required on tag - Section, Class, Exhibit, Description (as written in book), exhibitor's name, address and phone number. Premiums of \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00 will be paid for arrangements and exhibits. Best of Show in Arrangements and in Horticulture is \$10.00.

**\* These flowers can be accepted on Wednesday morning from 9:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.**

**For each item entered in Horticulture & Floriculture, a raffle ticket will be issued. The ticket may be entered in any of the raffles provided by local businesses.**

## GENERAL RULES

1. Only one entry may be made in each class, except in classes which are subdivided. In those only one entry per subdivision.
2. No artificial flowers or foliage permitted.
3. One First, Second and Third place awards will be given in each category if merited. Best of Show will be awarded in Arrangements and in Horticulture.
4. The classification committee accepting entries may disqualify any exhibit which does not comply with the schedule. Disqualified and/or late entries may be placed for viewing only, and will be marked "Not for Competition."
5. Exhibitor is responsible for keeping their specimens or arrangements watered. Any flower past prime will be removed from show.
6. All arrangements must be in one container or setting to allow for movement at judging.
7. No exhibitor will be allowed to set up or rearrange after 8:00 p.m. Tuesday.

## SECTION 1 - ARRANGEMENTS

**RULES:** Flowers need not be grown by the exhibitor. Foliage and accessories are permitted unless otherwise noted (no silk flowers), and must be contained on one platform. All arrangements MAY contain both fresh and/or dried plant material (EXCEPT where indicated in the class). Fresh materials MAY be treated, i.e, paint, glitter, dye, etc. Cut fruit and vegetables are permitted, but must be sealed. Use your imagination to create a Vision from the Past which will be Remembered by those in the Future!

### **Class:**

#### **Proud of the Past, Poised for the Future:**

1. Hopes & Memories - Mixture of fresh and dried materials.
2. A New Life Ahead - Bridal or baby arrangement, may contain fresh and decorative material.
3. Mini Wonders - Miniature garden using dried and/or fresh materials.
4. Ancient and Culinary Delights - Three or more herbs in a planted container.
5. Into the Looking Glass - Terrariums.

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## SECTION 2 - HORTICULTURE

**RULE:** All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor. Exhibitor to provide clear jars or bottles in proportion to size of specimen. No cans or beer bottles; no colored jars or bottles are allowed. Each specimen to be a single stem unless otherwise noted. Exhibits to be well groomed, insect free, and no oiling or dressing of foliage is allowed. No foliage below the water-line. Please have each specimen labeled with the correct botanical name, variety, and cultivar. Those plants grown for foliage effect are exhibited as leaves only, not in bloom (example: coleus). The botanical name is given in the schedule when it differs from the common name.
